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THE FIRST 2 WEEKS

Friday 30th January - Poowhiri for our new staff and students

8.50am Meet with your house leaders at the front of the school. You will be guided to the Poowhiri in houses. You will meet with others in your house immediately after the poowhiri in the following venues:

Horotiu (HTU): G2 and G3

Parawhau (PAR): Hall stage

Te Koopu Maania (TKM): Old gym

Te Koo Utu (TKU): New gym (downstairs)

Pukeroro (PKU): Activities Room

Te Oko Horoi (TOH): New gym (upstairs)

10.00am During this time, students from Parawhau, Pukeroro and Horotiu will be with their Form Teachers for activities in their form classes and get their photos taken.

Year 9 Photos (supported by student leaders) will be rostered as follows:

10.00-10.25 Parawhau

10.25-10.50 Pukeroro

10.50-11.15 Horotiu

Form Teachers will take their students to photos and escort them back to their form rooms. The remaining houses are in the new gym and meet their Peer Support Leaders for activities in core classes.

11.15am Interval

11.30am During this time, students from Te Koo Utu, Te Koopu Maania and Te Oko Horoi will be with their Form Teachers for activities in their form classes and get their photos taken.

Year 9 Photos (supported by student leaders) will be rostered as follows:

11.30am - Te Koo Utu (to go straight to photos and then to form class)

11.55am - Te Koopu Maania

12.20am - Te Oko Horoi

Form teachers take students to photos and escort back them back to their form rooms. Students from Parawhau, Pukeroro and Horotiu to go straight back to the new gym to meet their Peer Support Leaders for activities in core classes.

12.35pm Brief Form time for ALL Houses so the Form teacher can escort students to their allocated BYOD rooms.

12.45pm BYOD Session 1 - Students will be organised in their Core class.

1.30pm LUNCH

2.05pm BYOD Session 2

3.00pm New Gym - Summary of day and outline of the coming week before students are dismissed.

5.30pm Year 9 Parents/Students Introduction Evening. All parents are invited to meet the form teacher and key staff.



Monday 2nd February

8.45am Year 9 Assembly – New Gym

9.35am Period 2. Refer to timetables provided on induction day or the online version, available through KAMAR

10.20am Full School Assembly – New Gym

Students go to Form room first and the Form teachers will take attendance and bring students across to the assembly to seat students in their Houses. No shoes are to be worn inside gym.

11.30am Period 3, 4, lunch and period 5.

3.10pm School finishes. Note: there will be a meeting for all bus students at 2:50pm in the hall.

Tuesday 3rd & Wednesday 4th February

Year 9 Cultural Days. Full details of these days will be shared with families via email closer to the date.

Thursday 5th February

This is a normal school day. Note that Thursdays have a later start at 8.50am to allow for staff Professional Learning. From today onwards students will be on a normal school timetable. This can be found online, or students can refer to their printed version.

Friday 6th February – Waitangi Day

Cambridge High School is closed for instruction for Waitangi Day – y 6

Wednesday 11th February

Athletics Day. This is a full school House event, with juniors taking part in different athletics events all day. Remember to pack sunscreen, a water bottle and a can-do attitude. This day is to provide students with the chance to:

- Race in competitive Events. This is a race, but don't be intimidated. You will be surprised at how well you can compete against others, and you get more points for the competitive events.
- Join in participation events. This is about building points for your house by completing as many events as possible.
And build connections with staff, other students in your House and the senior students, as the leaders are responsible for building the house spirit for the day.

STAFF AT CHS

This section outlines the key people you will need to know about as you find your feet at Cambridge High School.

Form Teacher

Your Form Teacher should always be your first contact with any queries or concerns. They, along with your Year Level Deans, are always there to help you find your feet in your new school. At CHS we have vertical form classes which means that in form time, you will be spending time with students from Year 9 through to Year 13. Each of the members of your Form Class will also be in the same House. During this time, we will share the notices, build House connections, monitor academic progression and attendance and support students with their pastoral and academic well-being. Your class will be identified by the 5-6 letters under your name on your Timetable. The first three letter refers to your house. The last 2-3 letters refers to your Form Teacher (e.g. TOHPRM - TOH refers to Te Oko Horoi and PRM are the code of the Form Teacher). Your Form Teacher's email contact will be teacher initials@camhigh.school.nz (e.g. prm@camhigh.school.nz)

Whaanau Form Class

There is one whaanau form class per House that operates within a framework of Te Ao Maaori to provide support and assistance for students during their schooling at Cambridge High School. There is a total of six Whaanau Form Classes that have a strong connection and relationship with one another. Students that choose to enter a Whaanau Form Class will go into the one associated with their house. Like the mainstream form classes, Whaanau Form classes also operate vertically (Year 9 to Year 13) and are facilitated by Cambridge High School staff. Anyone can join a Whaanau Form Class so please contact us if you are interested in being included in this kaupapa. Matua Corbett, our Te Reo Maaori teacher, oversees these Form Classes, his email is cb@camhigh.school.nz.

Guidance Counselling Team

Guidance Counselling at Cambridge High School is set up to provide students with a safe and supportive environment in which students can speak with someone about working through the challenges of life they may face.

The counselling relationship is one that is caring, confidential and built on mutual respect. Students can refer themselves to counselling whenever they feel the time is right and can approach the counsellors directly or via email.

When caregivers, friends or school staff feel a student has a counselling need and would like to request an appointment for them, this can be done by completing our online referral form. 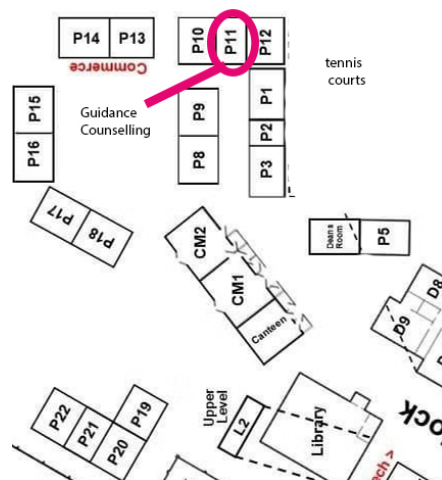

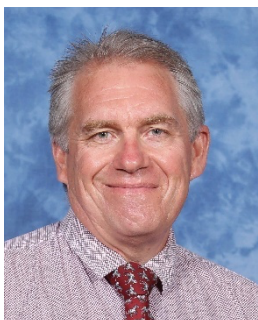

LIFE AT CHS

Performing Arts and Culture

We have a busy performance calendar with senior level productions, showcase evenings, visiting theatre companies and workshops from around New Zealand. We also offer a wide range of opportunities for our students to get involved, either as an expert or to learn a new skill and perform with friends.

Cambridge High School Music groups include a Big Band, Concert Band, Vox (Upper voices ensemble), Guitar Ensemble, Chamber Groups, Jazz Bands and student led Rock Bands. These groups have won a range of awards at regional and national level. Small group instrumental tuition provided by qualified tutors is also available for music students who wish to contribute to school music groups and/or study NCEA Music.

Te Piringa Maaori O Tauwiwi, the school Kapa Haka group, welcomes all rangitahi and performs regularly representing the school with dignity and strength. This group is also supported by the option of studying Te Ao Haka as a subject.

Students can be involved in dance troupes in a range of styles, including Hip Hop, Jazz, Contemporary, Lyrical and Musical Theatre. Within these troupes, there are opportunities for performing within inclusive teams across junior, senior and combined teams. There are also opportunities for leadership as choreographers, committee members and mentoring roles. Troupes work toward competitions with DanceNZmade and participate in a range of community performances and showcases throughout the year.

Drama activities include a biennial school production, social and competitive Theatresports, Shakespearean Club/competitions. We also offer drama clubs and the chance to work behind the scenes and learn the technical side of the theatre with our Backstage Theatre Crew. Senior drama students can work towards being the Year 13 Tuakana which provides a leadership opportunity to mentor and assist with the junior drama clubs and Theatresports.

Sport

We have approximately 30 different competitive and recreational sports which provides extensive opportunities for our students' sporting needs and interests. The strength of our programme is built upon excellent community links and support, with skilled staff and friends of the school assisting students in all co-curricular sports. Our participation rates for sport are amongst the highest in the Waikato and from this strong base we achieve regional and national sporting success across several codes.

Our inter-house sports competitions (school athletics day, swimming sports and cross country) promote physical activity, encourage a sense of belonging and involvement, and provide the experience of being part of a team.

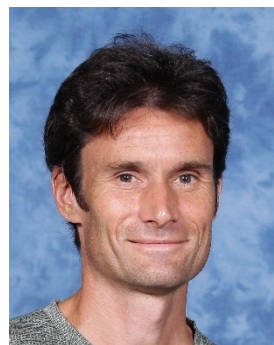

Curriculum Overview

Cambridge High School offers a rich and varied range of subjects at all levels. Our broad curriculum provides each student access to a range of learning experiences.

The curriculum provides the best possible opportunities to prepare students for tertiary study and the workplace. We emphasise the development of key capabilities as well as academic progress.

Year 9

All students study:

- English, Mathematics, Science, Social Sciences, and Health and Physical Education.
- A range of Technologies, Languages, and Arts.

Some students will participate in:

- The Extension Learning Programme.
- The Junior+ classes that undertake a long-term passion project.
- Targeted Literacy and Numeracy classes.
- A specialist Home Room environment.

Year 10

All students study:

- English, Mathematics, Science, Social Sciences, and Health and Physical Education.

Some students will participate in:

- The Extension and Accelerated Programme.
- The Junior+ classes that undertake a long-term passion project.
- Targeted Literacy and Numeracy classes.

Students also choose options from:

Getting to and from school

Buses

The bus loading area is situated by the main entrance to school off Swayne Road. Pupils must be prompt, line up in an orderly fashion and behave while on the bus. Please contact contact1@camhigh.school.nz if you have any questions about the bus system.

We expect all students to follow school rules and uphold our school values when using the buses. Any concerning behaviour will be addressed.

Bicycles and scooters

The bicycle stands are located behind Te Miro, near to the entrance through the town belt in Tom Voyle Park. All students are encouraged to have their own bike lock and must take their bikes and scooters home during the evening. This facility is locked and secure during the school day only. Please note that no responsibility is taken by the school for damage or loss to bikes, scooters, etc.

Remember to ride in a way that is safe and is respectful of others in our in community. Do not ride on the footpath, know your road rules and ALWAYS wear your bike helmet.



Pick up

Parents are to park on Taylor Street for pick up. Students are to walk to this pick up point. When crossing the road, students must cross where the crossing bays are only.

PC4L (Positive Culture for Learning)

Uniform Guidelines

Cambridge High School students are required to wear their uniform neatly and completely. We aim to develop self-responsibility in our students for always wearing the uniform correctly. Occasionally there is a justified reason for incorrect uniform items. In this case, the student needs to get a uniform pass from the Deans to excuse the item(s). Repeated instances of wearing school uniform incorrectly and without a uniform pass, will be treated as defiant behaviour and whaanau will be involved in resolving the concern. 2026 New Uniform

This year, a new uniform is being launched for Years 9, 12 and 13 students. Year 9 students are expected to wear the new junior uniform. Year 12 and 13 students are expected to wear the new senior uniform.

Year 9, 12 and 13 Students

- SHOES - Plain black lace-up shoes, preferably leather or leather look (not boots).
- SOCKS – Blue crew CHS socks
- SANDALS - Summer only (Term 1 and 4) - Plain black or brown (tidy) Roman style sandals. Sandals must have a strap over the front of the foot, a back strap, be flat soled, and have black or silver buckles only. No slip-ons and no socks with sandals.
- Scarf - Plain navy blue, black or white.
- Hat - Regulation school cap or beanie.
- Jacket - CHS jacket with school crest.

Year 10 and 11 Students

- SHOES - Plain black lace-up shoes, preferably leather or leather look (not boots).
- SOCKS
Style A - white or black ankle socks, or navy or black pantyhose (colder months).
Style B - CHS school socks with blue and white band ONLY.
- SANDALS - Summer only (Term 1 and 4) - Plain black or brown (tidy) Roman style sandals. Sandals must have a strap over the front of the foot, a back strap, be flat soled, and have black or silver buckles only. No slip-ons and no socks with sandals.
- OPTIONAL: - CHS jacket with school crest.
 - Plain navy blue, black or white scarf.
 - Regulation school cap.
 - Navy blue or black raincoat, worn to and from school only, not in classes. No puffer jackets permitted.



Appearance

- Hair is to be kept clean and tidy. Natural coloured dyed hair is acceptable. However, extreme hairstyles/colours are not permitted at school.
- Only permitted jewellery items. This includes:
 - Sleepers or plain stud earrings (up to three per ear).
 - One small discreet ring.
 - One bracelet.
 - One culturally significant item, such as a taonga, worn around the neck.
 - One small discreet stud nose piercing. Rings are not permitted.
 - Other body piercings are not permitted (i.e. eyebrow, lip, septum).
- Neutral make-up and neutral nail polish only (i.e. light pink, peach, tan). Acrylic and gel nails are not permitted.
- No facial hair. Where exceptions have been made (with SLT) for cultural reasons, this must be kept clean and tidy.
- No visible tattoos.

Non-Uniform Days

Clothes should be clean, modest and appropriate. Students should not wear any offensive or revealing or unsafe clothing.

Frequently Asked Questions

Please note the following FAQ for uniform items:

- All students may choose from Uniform Style A OR Uniform Style B. However, the complete uniform must be worn from each style, not crossing over the two styles i.e. the tartan skirt cannot be worn with the blue polo.
- All shirts and blouses are designed to be worn out, not tucked in.
- The winter uniform is also the formal uniform, to be worn as required when representing the school and for formal school attire
- The winter uniform may be supported by a thermal layer. This layer must be discrete, worn beneath the shirt and as close as possible to the same colour as the shirt, plain and with no branding on the sleeves.
- Those in Uniform Style A may wear plain white or black ankle socks only. They must be visible socks, not low-cut anklets or crew socks. Those in Uniform Style B must wear school uniform socks only. These styles are clearly defined on our [website](#).
- No CHS Sports uniform items to be worn during the school day. These are reserved for trainings, sports games and events only.
- School uniform jackets are available for purchase. On days where the rain is heavy,



dark blue or black non-uniform rain jackets may be worn (over a complete school uniform) to and from school and in between classes. Students are not to wear puffer jackets.

- Only approved CHS branded hats may be worn. Caps and beanies are available from The Uniform Shoppe. Bucket hats are available for purchase at our school office.

Health and Safety in Science and Technology Classrooms

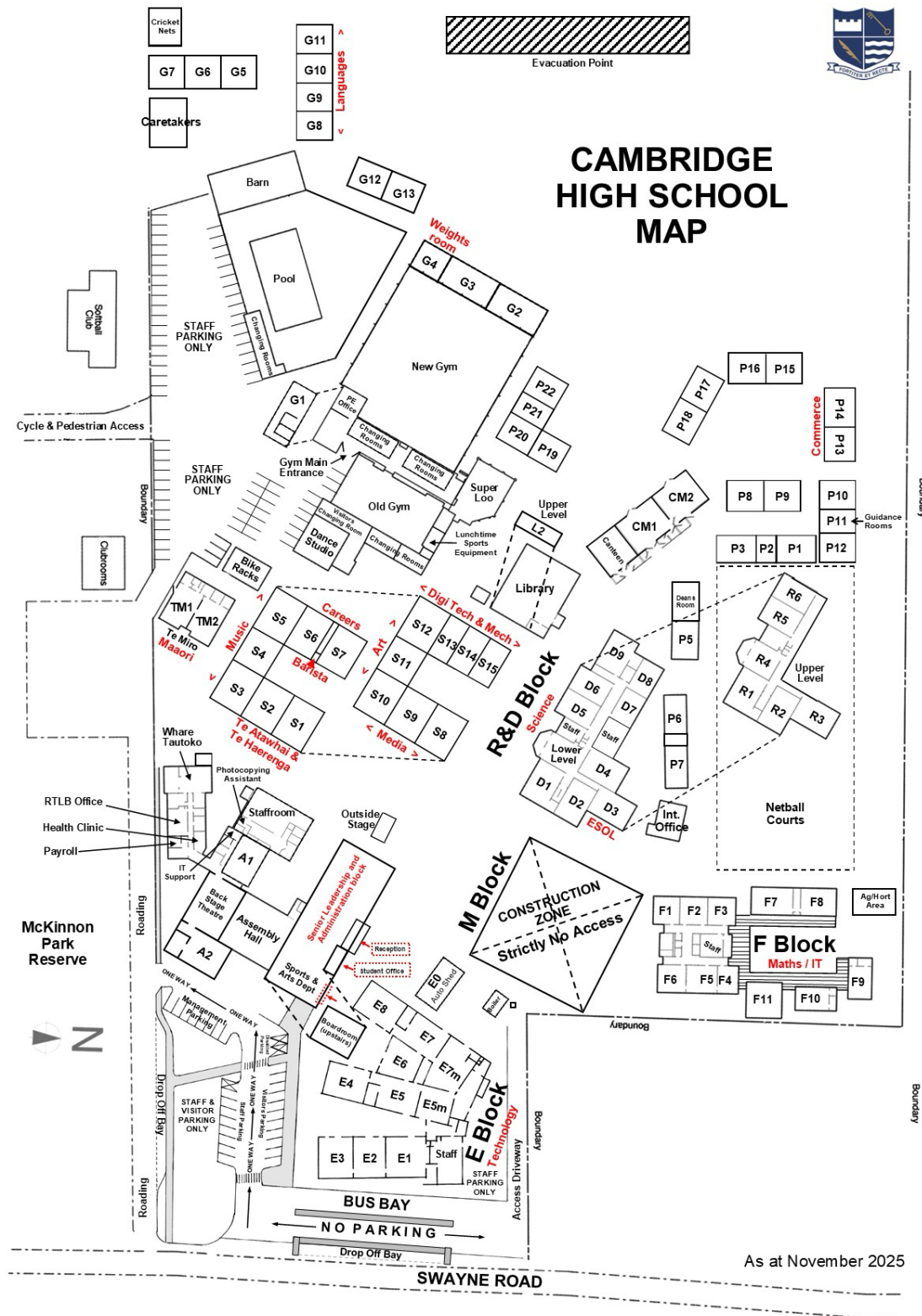
In line with the updated Health and Safety Act (2016), all students are required to wear closed-in shoes when they are in Science Laboratories or in Technology Workshops (including the Food and Fabrics classrooms).

During summer months, students must bring a change of footwear to take part in lessons in these rooms, for their own safety. If students are not wearing closed toe shoes, they will either be asked to put on a of pair shoes supplied by the school or they will not be allowed to take part in the lesson.

If students bring other closed toe shoes and these shoes are not a part of the school uniform they may only be worn for the Science and Technology lessons.

BYOD (Bring Your Own Device)

Cambridge High School is a Bring Your Own Device school. This means every student requires a laptop to bring to school each day for learning purposes in every year level. We have a “blended learning” approach where students work both digitally and more traditionally writing in books. We do not offer fully online courses. Digital technology and learning are part of each programme, providing the potential to enhance and increase engagement in learning, and help students learn important digital skills.

Each teacher will share many resources in their subject or class Teams. These can be accessed from home as well as within school. In many subjects, homework will be accessed and completed digitally. Subject or Class Teams will also be used by teachers to communicate with students, and for students to collaborate. The school provides Office 365 free of charge to all students.

There is a lot of information on the school website on digital learning and BYOD. In particular, parents and students should read carefully [BYOD FAQ for Parents](#). This outlines the device specifications, our blended approach, and the responsibilities of students when using their devices. Students will also need to sign and be familiar with the cyber-safety agreement (also found on the Cambridge High School website).

The school has support in place if a family is unable to purchase a laptop outright. If you need further information, please email Mrs Webb, Deputy Principal, on ce@camhigh.school.nz for details.

Careers education is integrated into the curriculum and gives a rich and varied approach to learning about careers and pathways for students

School Website

The [CHS Website](#) is a live and dynamic site which stores up-to-date information and provides connections with our other communication channels. The CHS student media team will use it to share their stories and images of school life. CHS uses it to store documents relevant to prospective and existing staff and students. It will be a more formal and edited piece of communication.

Email

This direct method will be the primary method of targeted communication with parents, staff and students.

School Facebook

This is used to share our more informal communication, promotion of upcoming events, and to facilitate sporting and cultural groups. Other groups that include CHS students are likely to use the school's name in their social media group. In this case the group must be closed. CHS will maintain a register of these groups and may require their closure if they could potentially harm the reputation of the school. [Cambridge High School NZ](#)

Homework

Homework serves an important role in developing good study and work habits in our high school students. Research in Neuroscience shows that repetition, and reinforcement of skills and concepts, are important to develop surface level knowledge. This foundation must be sound before deeper thinking is possible. Teachers post homework for each class in their Class Teams. This can be accessed by students from any computer with internet connection. In general, junior students can expect a total amount of homework from each day's subject every night in the region of:

Year 9: 40-60 minutes

Year 10: 60 minutes

Note: Senior students will be guided by their subject teachers as per homework requirements.



Computer Systems Tips

We will go through items in detail in the BYOD sessions. The following are helpful tips to using our school computer system:

- Log onto Office 365 using your email address and school password.
- Log on a school PC using your username (not email address) and password. Any teacher can give you these details.
- Printing - For the first time usage, use the Kamar number on timetable and generate your own 4-digit pin when prompted (4 numbers, no letters). Input the 4-digit pin twice.
- All printing is done to Virtual BW and Virtual C printers. This means once sent to these printers you can release the job from any printer when logging in to that printer. There is also a link on the top of the school website for web print which means you can print from outside of school or on CHS Public wifi.
- [Kamar Portal](#) use logon credentials to view school progress, the students' timetable, etc. Parents and students have their own separate logins and passwords that are emailed or posted at the start of the year. This portal contains: Notices, Calendar, Details, Timetable, Attendance, NCEA Summary, Current Year Results, All Results, Groups, Pastoral, Awards, Reports, Fees, Profile, and Library.
- Our school uses Linewize's Connect software to ensure devices are used effectively while at school to support students' academic success. This includes BYOD devices.
- In order to ensure that every student BYOD device that connects to the school network has Connect installed and running, we are implement Linewize's Walled Garden on the school's BYOD network. Walled Garden checks if Linewize Connect is running on your BYOD device when the device attempts to access the school's network. If Connect is not running on the device, you cannot access the network except to download and install Connect so you can then access the internet. Once Connect is running on the BYOD device, it will be able to access the school's network and the internet.

School Nurses

The school has a full time Registered Nurse on site at all times. Two nurses share this role, Catherine and Silvana, who can generally be visited between the hours of 9:15am and 3:15pm. The nurse's office and sick bay are located in the Student Support building.

Please note that it is expected that you bring a note from your teacher if you are visiting the nurse during class time.

If you are feeling sick during the day, you must go to the School Nurse and she will make contact with your parent/caregiver if you need to go home. ***You must not make your own arrangements to get picked up, as the school has a responsibility to know if you are attending school or are no longer on the school grounds***

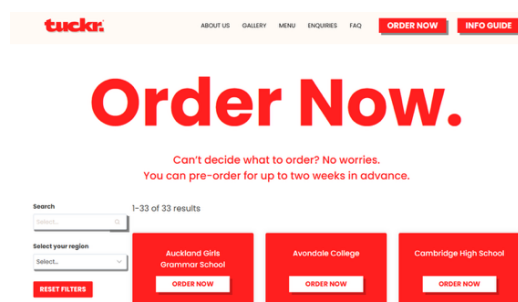

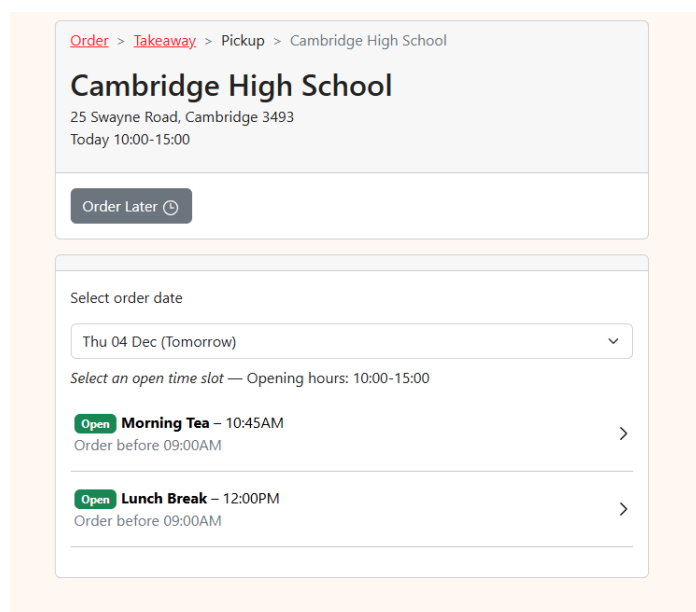

Your School Crest & Motto

The crest you see is our school emblem. You will find it on school jerseys, reports, magazines, team jerseys, school blazers and so on.



We have **four** 'cornerstones' which relate to the symbols in our crest, which has four quadrants.

Learning relates to the feather quill, symbol of learning and knowledge.

Tradition relates to the castle, symbol of lasting strength.
